

Olicy

A Board Member is defined as:

- 1. A representative designated by a member community as defined in Article 5.1.b.i. of the Articles of Association
- 2. A Board member is accepted by the Membership pursuant to Article 5.1.b.ii

Policy NEW

A policy which requires that Membership dues be reviewed at the Annual General Meeting held in June each year.

Membership dues for Associate members – resolution of Membership for non-municipal members.

Associate members, as accepted by 2/3 of the BRAED membership shall anticipate membership fees as follows:

a. Unaffiliated Individual member Annual Fee \$100 full member
b. A non-profit organization Annual Fee \$250

c. A business entity with under 25 employees Annual Fee \$250

d. A business entity with 26 - 50 employees Annual Fee \$500

e. A business entity with over 50 employees Annual Fee \$1000

5. Project Updates

a. Value-added Agriculture Program

- i. Value-added Agriculture Cluster Development
 - The project update as of November 15, 2019, saw the team following up on leads generated through the contacts developed by Bob Burden during his trip to Europe. It was learned that potential investors are less interested in general marketing material and want hard financial and infrastructure details that can be used for scoping out new ventures in the value-added agriculture space. The team considered both the applicability and availability of data for two types of potential venture: a pulse processing facility or a greenhouse. Upon further investigation, it was decided that a greenhouse project would be more instructive as part of the final deliverable project. After some discussion, members of the executive

committee were concerned about the switch to a Greenhouse from what was initially asked. There was also concern that the Greenhouse market could be saturated.

b. One Less Trip Retail Promotion

- Project outline was to include 4 workshops and promotion of Christmas markets and retailers through a program called the Santa Trail. Due to poor initial numbers, it was decided to cancel the workshops a week out. There was one cost that we could not avoid due to cancellation. It was for the South Africa House in Wainwright deposit of \$210. Instead, we launched the Santa Trail on the November 16th and 17th weekend tying in Christmas markets in Holden and Daysland along with some retailers in Tofield and Camrose. Santa Trail #1 was promoted via email to over 20 people, including economic development people, tourism people and retailers and restaurant owners. Santa Trail #1 was shared on the BRAED website, Go East of Edmonton website and the One Less Trip Facebook page. Gridstone boosted the OLT Facebook post and we had 6484 people see the post with 488 engagements. Since then we have released Santa Trail #2 on the November 23rd and 24th weekend, and Santa Trail #3 will be out on Monday November 25th. Additionally, Gridstone will have two videos targeted for early December release. Video Topic 1 = Storytelling and Social Media (20 30 minutes long) and Video Topic 2 Selling at Tradeshows (20 30 minutes long).
- BRAED Executive likes how it was pushed out after the initial workshops didn't get the attention we were hoping for.
